LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

I am proud to share our 2024-2025 Annual Report reflecting on our seventh year of the Institute for Health Innovation at Northern Kentucky University. Here are a few highlights:

We had over \$9 million in active grants and contracts, which we used to:

- complete the construction for the Grant County Rural Nurse Program,
- support health-related regional entrepreneurs in achieving their dreams,
- improve healthcare availability for underserved populations,
- increase the reach of our K-12 pipeline programs.

Our impact in the region and across the Commonwealth has been significant. Here are a few highlights.

Since starting the on-line certification program for Kentucky Adult Peer Support Specialists program in 2019, we have certified 1,149 students from around the Commonwealth to serve as peer supports for those struggling with substance misuse or mental health issues. This makes us the second largest provider of peer support certification in Kentucky!

We also offer free continuing education units (CEUs) for Kentucky Peer Supports through NKU's Community Connections program. Over 2,500 peer supports from around the Commonwealth have participated in this program.

In the past four years, over 250 NKU students in Human Resources and Addictions, Counseling, and Social Work who are committed to working with underserved populations after they graduate have received more than \$1.7 million through our federally funded scholarship and stipend programs.

We brought more than 2,500 students interesting the health-related majors to campus and supported NKU student groups in offering more than 25 health-related programs that reached more than 2,500 participants.







GROWING THE INNOVATION ECOSYSTEM

ADVANCING ENTREPRENEURSHIP

Our initiatives in health care innovation aim to support and attract companies, jobs, and talent in the health innovation sector to Northern Kentucky. They stimulate and help commercialize health innovation by aligning our top economic development, healthcare, university, and startup assets. Over the past year, we have assisted over 42regional startups in raising over \$30 million in capital investments. SoCap Accelerate, our pre-Series A accelerator for health-related companies, successfully graduated their ninth and tenth cohorts.

The January Demo Day featured:

- Trestle: Trestle uses Al-automation to help you accurately qualify trade-partners and vendors in seconds, not weeks.
- Our Harvest: Our Harvest Co-op is a worker-and community-owned farm and food-hub co-op that creates access to healthy, local food in a way that honors land and labor.
- Cheekos: Giving caregivers the power to increase mobility for patients, decreasing the possibilities of injuries to caregivers by combining a power chair and lifting device.

ADVANCING BIOMEDICAL INNOVATION

<u>LifeSciKY</u> is a lab incubator accelerating science, entrepreneurism, education and economic development. From affordable lab space and state-of-the-art equipment to collaborative partnerships and networking opportunities, LifeSciKY empowers innovators with the critical resources and connections they need to bring their work to life.

IMPROVING HEALTH

GROWING BEHAVIORAL HEALTHCARE CAPACITY

With NIH funding, and in partnership with Gateway Community and Technical College, students majoring or minoring in Human Services and Addictions, Social Work, or Counseling, receive scholarships, stipends for field placement, and apprenticeship sponsorship. Through this initiative, we supported 346 students and dispensed over \$1.7 million in funding.

In 2024-2025, we certified 260 trainees as Kentucky Adult Peer Support Specialists from around the Commonwealth to serve as peer supports for those struggling with substance misuse.

We also have expanded our continuing education units (CEUs) for Kentucky Certified Peer Support Specialists through NKU's Community Connections program. New modules include

- Substance Use and Family Impacts
- Prevention Approaches for Substance Use in **Families**
- Opioid Use, Stigma, and Social Connection
- Harm Reduction
- Cultural Competence

This year, we provided additional training to over 2,000 current healthcare paraprofessionals in the Commonwealth.

INFRASTRUCTURE

MEDICAID EVALUATION TEAM

The Medicaid evaluation team completed the nation's first statewide analysis of peer support contributions to recovery from Substance Use Disorder. This comprehensive evaluation provided compelling evidence that Kentucky's peer support services significantly improve treatment outcomes for individuals with substance use disorders and is a cost-effective intervention.



IMPROVING NKU'S SUPPORT SYSTEM

In its second year of funding from Interact for Health's Amplifying Youth Voice in Mental Health grant, NKU student organizations for planned their own mental health programming. Groups hosted 10 events ranging from a mocktail party to a 900+ attendee entrepreneurship showcase.



KENTUCKY DEPARTMENT FOR COMMUNITY-BASED SERVICES TRAINING PROGRAM NEW

The IHI was selected as one of three university partners in delivering workforce and professional training for the Kentucky Department for Community-Based Services, an agency in the Cabinet that provides family support and child and adult protection services. Together with other institutions in the Community Learning Network we provide workforce training system for DCBS employees and foster parents, kinship caregivers and community partners. We will receive \$2 million annually to implement training for the front-line workers in Family Support Services and in Protection and Permanency across seventeen counties in the northern Kentucky region.



SUPPORTING FUTURE

ADOPT A CLASS PARTNERSHIP & AWARD

This year began a partnership program with Adopt A Class to introduce 8th grade students to opportunities at NKU. Students participated in breakout sessions with NKU faculty and ate lunch in our dining hall for an authentic college experience. We were honored to be named Best Program Partner at the 2025 Adopt A Class Celebration Breakfast. We're proud to support the AAC mission and celebrate the power of mentorship alongside so many incredible partners and volunteers.



PK-12 PATHWAY PROGRAMS

The IHI's P-12 Pathway Programs Hub introduces P-12 students the Greater Cincinnati region to opportunities in higher education (especially at NKU) through a variety of programs at every age level.

We also help NKU faculty connect with the community by participating in existing activities or assisting them in developing new programs.




Middle School Field Trips **NEW**

NORSE SCRUBS CAMP

We offered a one-week overnight summer camp to students interested in healthcare careers. Coming primarily from rural Northern Kentucky, attendees participated in on-campus sessions on nursing, social work, human services, occupational therapy, respiratory therapy, neuroscience, and medicine.

Healthcare partners from the community both visited the students on campus and invited them into the field for tours and shadowing opportunities. All students became CPR & AED certified as part of this program as well.
